This workshop is designed to help producers develop integrated parasite management (IPM) programs for their sheep and goat farms. The instructor is Dr. Tatiana Stanton, Extension Goat Specialist. Internal parasites are the number one health problem affecting sheep and goats in much of the United States. Because worms have become resistant to many of the anthelmintics (dewormers), a more integrated approach to internal parasite control is necessary.

In addition to teaching the basics of internal parasites and their control, the workshop will teach proper anthelmintics use and provide lots of hands-on training in doing fecal egg analyses and using the FAMACHA® Anemia Guide to determine the need for deworming. Each farm will receive a handout package of IPM reference materials from the seminar and a laminated FAMACHA® guide.
